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DAILY PRACTICE QUESTIONS FROM STATIC PART

Q.1. With reference to the evolution of Sufi traditions in medieval India, consider the following statements:

1. The Chishti saints generally avoided direct political association with the ruling elites and emphasized proximity to the common people.
2. The Suhrawardi order rejected the acceptance of endowments and state patronage as a matter of doctrinal principle.

How many of the above statements are correct?

- (a) Only one
- (b) Both the statements
- (c) Neither of the statements
- (d) The correctness of the statements depends upon the region concerned

Answer: (a)

Explanation:

Statement 1 is correct. The Chishti saints, especially Khwaja Muinuddin Chishti, Baba Farid and Nizamuddin Auliya, emphasized spiritual life, service to humanity and relative distance from political authority.

Statement 2 is incorrect. The Suhrawardi order was comparatively more willing to accept state patronage, grants and official associations. Unlike the Chishtis, they did not completely avoid the ruling establishment.

Therefore, only one statement is correct.

Q.2. In the context of ecological succession, which one of the following statements is most appropriate?

- (a) Primary succession generally proceeds at a slower rate than secondary succession because soil formation itself is a limiting factor.
- (b) Secondary succession always results in a different climax community than the original ecosystem.
- (c) Primary succession can occur only in volcanic regions.
- (d) Secondary succession begins only after complete removal of both vegetation and soil.

Answer: (a)

Explanation:

Primary succession starts on a bare surface where soil is absent, such as exposed rocks, lava flows or newly formed land surfaces. The formation of soil through weathering and pioneer species takes considerable time.

Secondary succession occurs where soil already exists, such as after forest fires, floods or agricultural abandonment. Therefore, ecological recovery is usually faster.

Option (b) is incorrect because secondary succession may eventually restore the original climax community.

Option (c) is incorrect since primary succession can occur in many situations besides volcanic areas.

Option (d) is incorrect because the presence of soil is the defining feature of secondary succession.



Q.3. Consider the following statements regarding money supply and credit creation in an economy:

1. Commercial banks can create credit only to the extent of their excess reserves over the statutory reserve requirements.
2. A decline in the cash reserve ratio generally increases the lending capacity of commercial banks.
3. The process of multiple credit creation is completely independent of the public's currency-holding behaviour.

How many of the above statements are correct?

- (a) Only one
- (b) Only two
- (c) All the three
- (d) None

Answer: (b)

Explanation:

Statement 1 is correct. Banks can create credit primarily through their excess reserves after maintaining the required reserves.

Statement 2 is correct. A reduction in the Cash Reserve Ratio (CRR) leaves banks with greater lendable resources, thereby expanding credit creation.

Statement 3 is incorrect. The extent of credit creation depends significantly upon the currency-deposit ratio and the public's tendency to hold cash. Greater cash leakage reduces the money multiplier.

Hence, only two statements are correct.

Q.4. Consider the following statements regarding the constitutional position of the Parliament of India:

1. Money Bills can be introduced only in the Lok Sabha and only with the prior recommendation of the President.
2. The Rajya Sabha can amend a Money Bill if such amendments are accepted by the Lok Sabha.
3. A Constitutional Amendment Bill can be introduced in either House of Parliament.
4. In the case of an ordinary bill, a joint sitting can be summoned only after the Rajya Sabha has rejected the bill.

How many of the above statements are correct?

- (a) Only one

Answer: (c)

Explanation:

Statement 1 is correct. Article 109 and Article 117 provide that a Money Bill can originate only in the Lok Sabha and requires prior Presidential recommendation.



Statement 2 is correct. The Rajya Sabha may recommend amendments to a Money Bill, and the Lok Sabha may accept or reject those recommendations.

Statement 3 is correct. A Constitutional Amendment Bill under Article 368 may be introduced in either House.

Statement 4 is incorrect. A joint sitting may be summoned not only when the Rajya Sabha rejects a bill but also when the Houses finally disagree or when the Rajya Sabha does not pass the bill within six months.

Therefore, three statements are correct.

Q.5. Consider the following statements:

Assertion (A):

The Himalayan rivers generally exhibit greater seasonal variability in discharge in their lower courses than many peninsular rivers.

Reason (R1):

Himalayan rivers receive water from both monsoonal rainfall and snow or glacier melt.

Reason (R2):

Most peninsular rivers are entirely perennial and derive substantial water from glaciers.

- (a) Both R1 and R2 are correct and both explain A.
- (b) R1 is correct but R2 is incorrect.
- (c) Both R1 and R2 are correct but only one explains A.
- (d) Neither R1 nor R2 is correct.

Answer: (b)

Explanation:

The assertion is broadly correct. Himalayan rivers display significant seasonal fluctuations because monsoonal rainfall substantially increases discharge during the rainy season, while snowmelt and glacier melt contribute additional flow.

Reason 1 is correct because the dual sources of water—rainfall and snow/glacial melt—characterize Himalayan rivers.

Reason 2 is incorrect. Most peninsular rivers are rain-fed and largely dependent on the monsoon. They are generally not glacier-fed, and several exhibit seasonal characteristics.

Therefore, R1 is correct while R2 is incorrect, making option (b) the correct answer.

Q.1. Consider the following statements regarding the inclusion of Indian Government Securities in the Bloomberg Global Aggregate Bond Index:

1. Inclusion of Indian Government Securities in the index necessarily requires India to adopt full capital account convertibility.
2. The Fully Accessible Route (FAR) securities are eligible for investment by non-residents without investment ceilings.

How many of the above statements are correct?

Explanation:

Statement 1 is incorrect. Inclusion in global bond indices does not require full capital account convertibility. Several emerging economies have achieved index inclusion while retaining certain capital controls.

Statement 2 is correct. Government securities designated under the Fully Accessible Route are available to foreign investors without investment limits.

The inclusion of Indian bonds in global indices is expected to increase passive inflows, improve liquidity and reduce borrowing costs.

Q.2. With reference to the Prime Minister's Office (PMO), which one of the following statements is correct?

It is neither a constitutional nor a statutory body. The Principal Secretary to the Prime Minister is generally the senior-most official in the PMO.

Q.3. Consider the following statements regarding Night Vision Devices (NVDs):

1. Thermal imaging devices can detect objects even in complete darkness by sensing infrared radiation emitted by objects.
2. Image intensifier devices operate primarily by detecting gamma radiation reflected from targets.



3. Thermal imagers are generally less affected by camouflage based solely on visible colours.

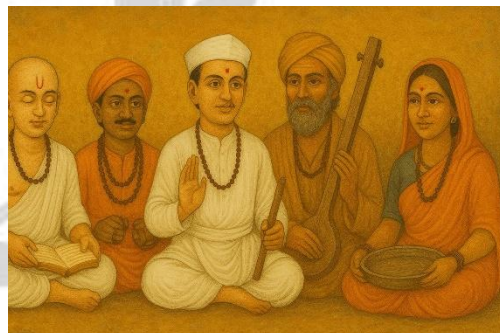

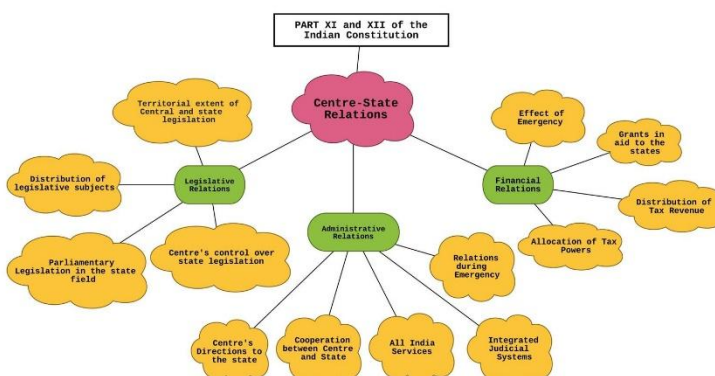
