1. National Horticulture Board Revises Eligibility Rules and Subsidy Norms

Key Highlights & Summary

- **Ineligibility Introduced:** The Centre amended guidelines for Commercial Horticulture and Cold Storage Schemes under the National Horticulture Board (NHB) to bar public office holders and government employees.
- **Barred Categories:** Ineligible groups include holders of constitutional posts, ministers, MPs, MLAs, MLCs, mayors, district panchayat chairs, and government staff (excluding Group D/MTS staff).
- **Expanded Definition of Family:** The term 'family' now includes the applicant's spouse, father, mother, sons, and daughters, replacing the earlier definition restricted to spouse and dependent minor children.
- **One-Family-One-Assistance Rule:** Assistance is capped at one member per family across all NHB schemes. Any prior assistance availed counts as the full entitlement for the entire family.
- **Subsidy Percentage Reduced:** Subsidies for general areas were reduced from 50% to 35% of eligible project costs. Maximum financial assistance for cold storage construction remains capped at Rs 2 crore.
- **Provision for Exit:** Beneficiaries can voluntarily opt out of schemes during the lock-in period by refunding the complete subsidy amount along with applicable interest.

2. ICMR Rules Out New Strain Amid H1N1 Swine Flu Surge in Delhi

Key Highlights & Summary

- **Surge in Capital Caseload:** Delhi recorded over 2,000 cases of Swine Flu (H1N1) this year, accounting for nearly 70% of respiratory infections in recent weeks.
- **No Mutation or New Strain:** The Indian Council of Medical Research (ICMR) clarified that no new H1N1 strain has emerged, ruling out public panic as nationwide numbers begin to drop.
- **Identified Viral Lineage:** The circulating strain is identified as A/Missouri/11/2025 (H1N1) pdm09-like virus (clade 6B.1A.5a2a, subclade D.3.1.1), circulating since 2025.
- **Vaccine Alignment:** Circulating viral strains remain well-matched with Northern Hemisphere seasonal influenza vaccine formulations.
- **Etiological Factors:** Environmental pollution, extreme monsoon weather, dust, and weakened immune defense mechanisms contributed to heightened transmission.
- **Self-Limiting Nature:** H1N1 remains a self-limiting illness requiring supportive care, though high-risk groups (children, elderly, immunocompromised) face greater risk of complications.

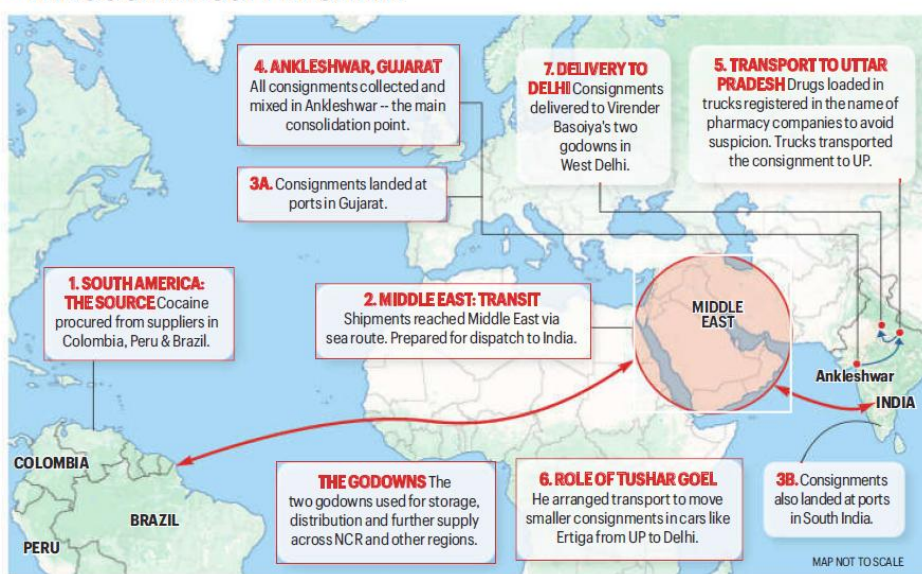

3. Extradition of Alleged Kingpin Virender Baisoya and Dismantling of Transnational Cocaine Cartel

Key Highlights & Summary

- **Extradition of Racket Kingpin:** Enforcement agencies secured the return of fugitive Virender Singh Baisoya from the UAE, marking a key breakthrough in dismantling a major transnational narcotics network.
- **Multi-Tiered Supply Chain:** Raw cocaine procured from South American nations (Colombia, Peru, Brazil) was processed and routed through Dubai to Gujarat and Uttar Pradesh before final distribution in New Delhi.
- **Use of Shell Companies:** The cartel deployed shell pharmaceutical firms and forged documentation to bypass regulatory checks while fraudulently procuring raw precursor materials from legitimate chemical entities.
- **Significant Narcotics Recoveries:** Investigative operations led to massive drug busts, including over 1,200 kg of high-purity cocaine, 40 kg of Thai hydroponic marijuana, and 867 kg of mephedrone across Delhi and Maharashtra.
- **Modus Operandi:** The syndicate disguised illicit shipments as routine commercial packages (e.g., shirt packaging and snacks), distributing them through courier networks, local middleman, and digital platforms.
- **Inter-Agency Coordination:** The enforcement action involved coordinated operations between the Narcotics Control Bureau (NCB), Delhi Police Special Cell, Central Bureau of Investigation (CBI), and Interpol.

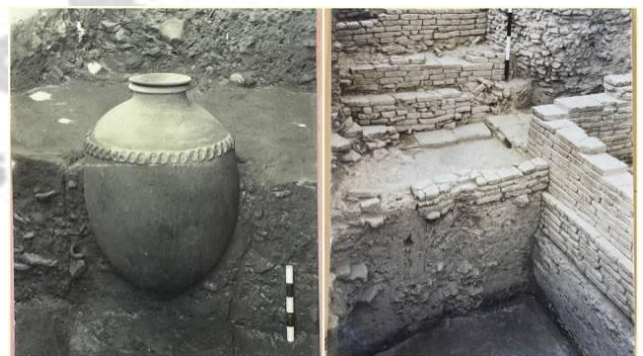

4. Opening of 22 Unopened Excavation Boxes from Rajghat Site by Banaras Hindu University

Key Highlights & Summary

- **Historic Artifact Discovery:** Banaras Hindu University (BHU) opened 22 sealed boxes containing over 10,000 artifacts excavated in 1957 from the Rajghat site in Varanasi that lay unopened for nearly 70 years.
- **Pottery and Cultural Continuity:** Recovered material includes painted black pottery estimated to be nearly 3,000 years old, helping trace continuous human settlement across six distinct cultural periods from 800 BC through the medieval era.
- **Rare Documentation and Visual Records:** The collection contains over 3,000 glass slides and 5,000 photographic negatives documenting ancient Indian archaeological sites including Rajghat, Manjhi, Ratnagiri, Ajanta, and Ellora.
- **Epigraphic Discoveries:** Findings include copper, ivory, and bone tools, alongside stamp seals bearing ancient inscriptions written in the Brahmi script, explicitly confirming the name "Varanasi".
- **Interdisciplinary Conservation:** BHU constituted three specialized research teams to undertake restoration, epigraphic analysis, and advanced bio-archaeological research on the material.
- **Ancient DNA Study On Human Remainder:** The initiative follows the recent sampling of a 70-year-old complete human skeleton recovered from the site for genetic and ancient DNA analysis to establish population linkage with the Indus Valley Civilization.

- **Interaction with Space Start-Ups:** Prime Minister Narendra Modi and National Security Advisor Ajit Doval met founders and CEOs of over 20 space start-ups ahead of National Space Day (commemorating Chandrayaan-3's lunar landing).
- **Global Talent Attraction:** The Prime Minister emphasized that India's emerging private space ecosystem can become a major force globally, attracting talent, Indian diaspora experts, and international scientific partnerships back to India.

- **Diversified Space Applications:** Start-ups are developing cutting-edge applications, such as space-based manufacturing facilities for specialized pharmaceuticals, satellite constellations, and advanced launch vehicles.
- **Policy Stability Assurance:** The government reiterated its commitment to providing a stable, predictable, and risk-tolerant space policy framework to support high-risk entrepreneurial ventures.





- **Socio-Economic Orientation:** Space entrepreneurs were encouraged to leverage space technology to address real-world challenges, enhance public welfare, and simplify citizens' lives.

- **Shift to Practical Engagement:** Five years after the US withdrawal from Kabul in August 2021, India transitioned from initial evacuation to pragmatic, non-formal diplomatic relations with the Taliban dispensation.
- **Protecting Strategic Investments:** Realpolitik considerations driven by India's USD 2-3 billion infrastructure investment and a desire to retain regional leverage prompted New Delhi to upgrade engagement without granting formal recognition.
- **Countering Regional Adversaries:** Strained relations between Pakistan and the Taliban, alongside expanding Chinese influence in Central Asia, opened geopolitical opportunities for India to rebuild influence in Afghanistan.





- **Upgraded Diplomatic Footprint:** Following high-level discussions between External Affairs Minister S. Jaishankar and Afghan Foreign Minister Amir Khan Muttaqi, missions in New Delhi, Mumbai, and Hyderabad operate under Taliban-appointed diplomats at the Charge d'Affaires level.
- **Security Imperatives:** Engagement is anchored on the core principle that Afghan territory must not be utilized for anti-India terrorism by groups like Jaish-e-Mohammad or Lashkar-e-Taiba.
- **Humanitarian Assistance:** India delivered extensive relief supplies, including 50,000 metric tonnes of wheat, 445 tonnes of medicines, disaster assistance, and development cooperation despite ongoing human rights concerns in Afghanistan.

7. Supreme Court Directs Fresh Survey of Elephant Corridors to Curb Conflict

Key Highlights & Summary

- **Judicial Intervention on Corridors:** A Supreme Court Bench led by Chief Justice of India Surya Kant directed the Centre to conduct a fresh survey of elephant corridors across states to ensure unhindered natural movement.
- **Prohibition of Coercive Measures:** The apex court barred the use of coercive methods such as fireballs, spikes, and hazardous barriers used to divert or drive away elephant herds from human habitats and agricultural fields.





- **Spatial and Seasonal Migration:** Male elephants require a home range of 50–300 sq km, while seasonal migrations (such as dry-season movement into Kerala's Western Ghats) are driven by water and forage availability.
- **Major Landscape Distributions:** India's elephant population is broadly divided into four key landscapes: Western Ghats, North-Eastern Hills and Brahmaputra floodplains, Shivalik Hills and Gangetic plains, and Central India and Eastern Ghats.
- **Severe Habitat Fragmentation:** Linear infrastructure development—highways, railway tracks, canals, power lines, alongside mining and expanding farmland—has severely fragmented traditional movement pathways.
- **Central India Challenges:** The Central India–Eastern Ghats complex faces acute conflict, with elephant herds expanding their traditional ranges into parts of Chhattisgarh, Odisha, Jharkhand, Madhya Pradesh, and Maharashtra.

8. Personalized mRNA Vaccine Shows Breakthrough in Skin Cancer Recurrence Reduction

Key Highlights & Summary

- **Clinical Breakthrough in Oncology:** Phase 3 trial results demonstrated that Intisimeran, a novel personalized mRNA cancer vaccine developed by Merck and Moderna, significantly reduces death risk from recurrence and spread of skin cancer.



- **Synergistic Immunotherapy Combination:** Administered alongside the checkpoint inhibitor Keytruda, the combination therapy reduced death risk from cancer recurrence by 49% and reduced death risk from distant metastasis by 59% compared to Keytruda alone.
- **Targeting Patient-Specific Neoantigens:** Each customized dose encodes for 34 unique neoantigens identified from a patient's tumor sample, training the immune system to recognize specific cancer fingerprints.
- **Low Melanoma Incidence in India:** According to Globocan, melanoma accounts for only 0.26% of all cancer cases and 0.17% of cancer deaths in India, making the immediate epidemiological impact limited compared to Caucasian populations.
- **Affordability and Access Barriers:** High costs present significant adoption hurdles in India, where real-world studies from Tata Memorial Hospital show only 1.6% of patients requiring advanced immunotherapy can currently access it.
- **Manageable Safety Profile:** Reported clinical side effects remained mild to moderate, primarily limited to fatigue, localized injection site pain, and temporary chills.

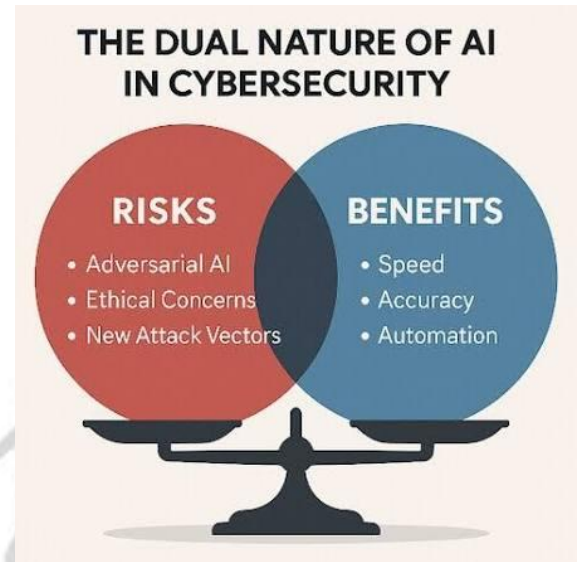

- **Rapid Amplification of Cyber Threats:** Artificial Intelligence (AI) accelerates threat velocity, scale, and sophistication across the entire cyber kill-chain, enabling automated reconnaissance, AI-generated deepfakes, highly targeted phishing, and autonomous offensive cyber operations.
- **Emergence of Polymorphic Malware:** Frontier AI models can autonomously generate, modify, and restructure code into polymorphic malware that dynamically adapts to bypass signature-based traditional antivirus systems and static patches.

- **Unbundling Test Prep Services:** DPI can unbundle expensive bundled services (content, doubt-solving, peer group, quality signaling) to drive the marginal cost of content and basic doubt-solving toward zero.
- **Open Protocol Architecture:** Inspired by UPI and ONDC, an open education protocol enables multiple front-ends (DIKSHA, private apps) to access a central content registry linked via student APAAR IDs and consent-gated data wallets.
- **Leveraging AI for Personalization:** Open-source AI models (e.g., Gemma) can offer cost-effective, real-time doubt-solving, adaptive diagnostics, and practice modules tailored to examinations like NEET and JEE.
- **Ensuring Educational Equity:** Universal access can be ensured via free data-light streaming, offline downloads, and utilization of 5 lakh+ Common Service Centres (CSCs) for students lacking personal digital devices.

11. State-Wise Divergence in Female Labour Force Participation Rate

Key Highlights & Summary

- **Surge in Female LFPR:** According to the Periodic Labour Force Survey (PLFS) 2025, overall Female Labour Force Participation Rate (FLPR) for individuals aged 15 and above rose from 30% in 2019-20 to 40% in 2025.
- **Rural-Urban Disparity:** The growth was significantly more pronounced in rural areas, where rural FLPR surged from 33% to 45.9%, compared to a modest rise from 23.3% to 27.7% in urban areas.
- **Rural Growth Leaders:** West Bengal, Uttar Pradesh, Gujarat, Odisha, Bihar, Rajasthan, and Haryana recorded an Average Annual Percentage Point (AAPP) change above the all-India rural average.
- **Urban Trends and Variations:** In urban areas, Rajasthan and Gujarat recorded strong gains with AAPP exceeding 2 percentage points per year, whereas states like Himachal Pradesh, Haryana, and Goa logged negative or minimal urban AAPP.
- **Baseline vs. Pace of Growth:** Assessing performance requires analyzing both baseline participation and AAPP; states like Tamil Nadu, Kerala, and Andhra Pradesh maintained high baseline participation despite lower or moderate AAPP growth.
- **Drivers of Regional Patterns:** Habitat shifts, agricultural reliance, local socio-economic dynamics, changing land use, and localized employment availability drive significant variations across states and between rural and urban sectors.

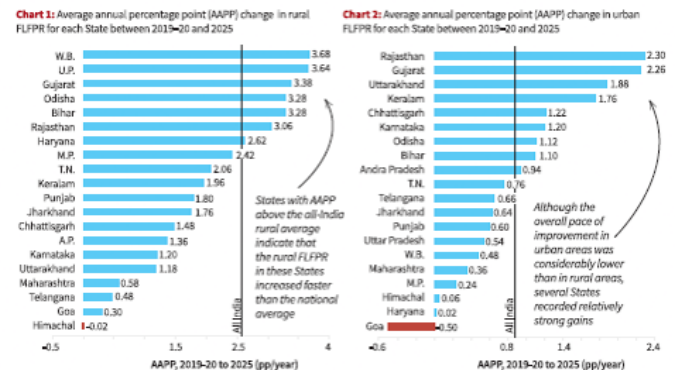
- **Labour Force Participation Rate (LFPR):** The percentage of persons in the population who are either working (employed) or actively seeking/available for work (unemployed).

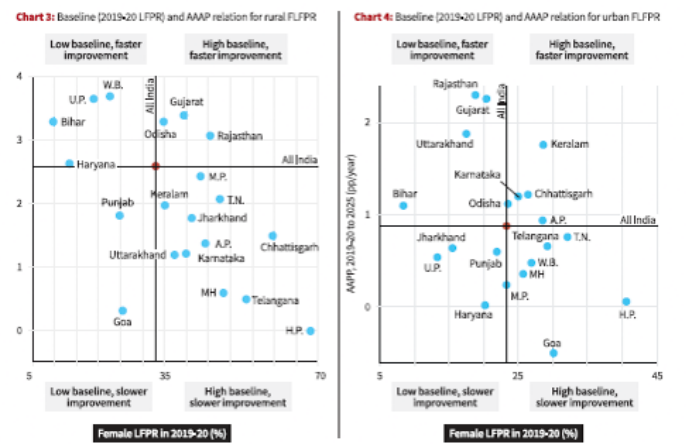

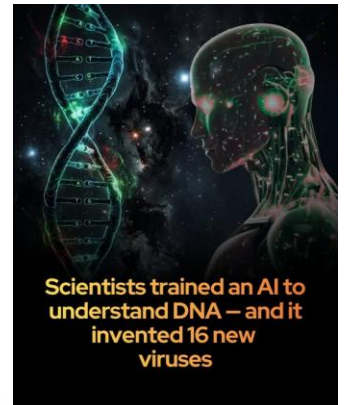
12. From Reading Genomes to Designing Them: The Dual-Use Dilemma of AI in Synthetic Biology
