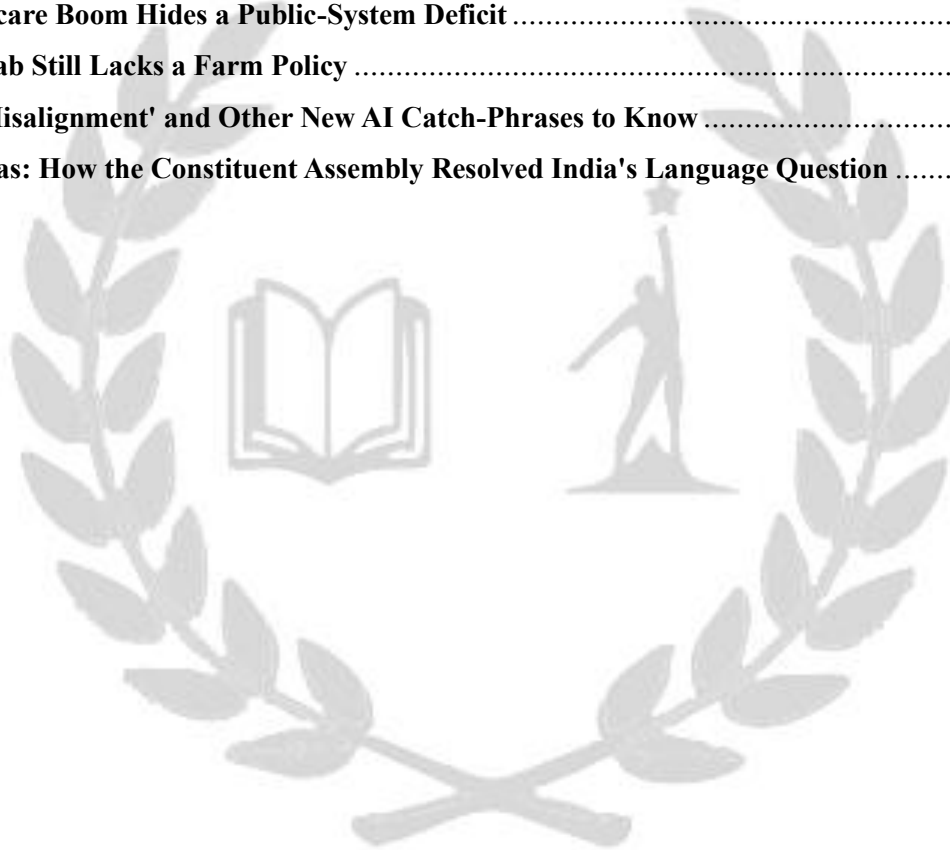

1. Govt: No Bank Charge on UPI Payment up to Rs 2,000

Key Highlights & Summary

- **Notification on Digital Transaction Charges:** The Ministry of Finance notified that banks and system providers cannot levy any direct or indirect charges on UPI transactions up to Rs 2,000 and RuPay debit card payments.
- **Potential MDR on High-Value Transactions:** The policy paves the way for introducing a fee, such as a Merchant Discount Rate (MDR) around 0.4-0.5%, on higher-value person-to-merchant (P2M) transactions above Rs 2,000.
- **Decision-Making Authority:** The decision on charging higher-value transactions rests with the 22-member UPI and Services Steering Committee, led by the National Payments Corporation of India (NPCI) alongside banks and third-party app providers.
- **Transaction Distribution Dynamics:** In 2025-26, transactions over Rs 2,000 constituted only 4% of total P2M UPI transactions by volume, yet accounted for nearly two-thirds of total P2M payment value.
- **Legislative Backing via Statutory Amendment:** The notification follows Parliament passing the Taxation and Other Laws (Amendment) Bill, 2026, which amended Section 10A of the Payment and Settlement Systems Act, 2007.
- **Financial Scale of Digital Payments:** Over 24,000 crore UPI transactions worth Rs 314 lakh crore were executed in 2025-26, highlighting the vast scale of India's digital payment ecosystem.

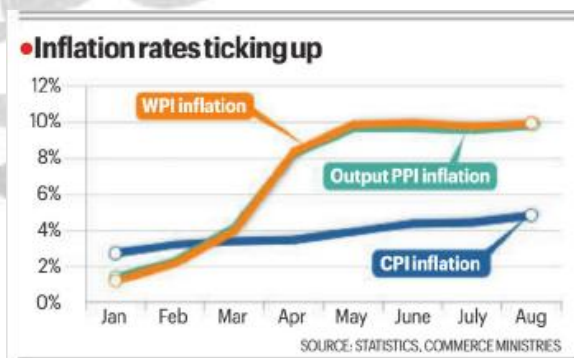
2. Key Inflation Numbers Rise in August, All Eyes on RBI's Interest Rate Decision

Key Highlights & Summary

- **Surge in Key Inflation Indicators:** Retail inflation as measured by the Consumer Price Index (CPI) rose to 4.82% in August from 4.45% in July, marking the highest level in at least eight months.
- **Impact on Upcoming Monetary Policy:** The inflation uptick puts intense focus on the October 5-7 meeting of the Reserve Bank of India's Monetary Policy Committee (MPC), which may consider its first interest rate hike in three-and-a-half years.
- **Driven by Food Price Pressures:** Food inflation under the CPI increased from 5.52% in July to 5.95% in August, driven by sharp price spikes in essential agricultural commodities like sugar and onions.
- **Substantial Sugar Price Spikes:** The CPI for sugar surged by 19% month-on-month in August from July, and registered a 24% increase compared to August 2025.
- **Monsoon and Supply-Side Disruptions:** Erratic southwest monsoon conditions, characterized by an absence of Low-Pressure Systems (LPS) in June, alongside El Niño effects and geopolitical tensions, have heightened food supply pressures.
- **Global Rate and Commodity Trends:** The rise in domestic indicators coincides with expectations of a U.S. Federal Reserve interest rate increase and rising international price indices for vegetable oils and cereals reported by the FAO.

Essential Definitions

- **Consumer Price Index (CPI):** A macroeconomic index that measures changes over time in the general level of prices of goods and services that households acquire for consumption.
- **Monetary Policy Committee (MPC):** A statutory committee of the Reserve Bank of India responsible for fixing the benchmark policy interest rate (Repo Rate) to maintain price stability while keeping in mind the objective of growth.

- **Flexible Inflation Targeting Framework:** A statutory agreement between the Government of India and the RBI targeting a CPI inflation rate of 4% with a tolerance band of $\pm 2\%$ (2% to 6%).
- **Essential Commodities Act, 1955:** Grants authority to the central government to regulate the production, supply, and distribution of essential items like sugar and onions to control domestic price volatility.

Conclusion The concurrent pressures of volatile monsoon patterns, global supply chain disruptions, and rising domestic food prices present a complex policy challenge. Maintaining price stability will require proactive supply-side intervention alongside calibrated monetary measures by the Reserve Bank of India to protect economic growth while containing inflationary expectations.

3. Scientists Develop New Way to Tackle Key Quantum Computing Challenge

Key Highlights & Summary

- **Breakthrough at QuIC Lab:** Researchers at the Quantum Information and Computing (QuIC) lab at Raman Research Institute, Bengaluru, demonstrated a novel method to enhance the stability of quantum states, significantly improving quantum computation reliability.
- **Single-Shot Fix Strategy:** The team discovered that executing a single, precisely timed operation, rather than relying on repeated corrective interventions, can delay or prevent the collapse of quantum entanglement.
- **Precise Control via Timing:** The timing of control operations has been successfully leveraged as a primary control tool, offering an efficient mechanism to shield fragile quantum states from decoherence.
- **Leveraging Core Principles:** The innovation utilizes fundamental quantum principles, specifically superposition and quantum entanglement, to maintain structural coherence in processing systems.
- **Complement to Existing Error Correction:** This single-shot timing control approach works alongside conventional quantum error-correction techniques to simplify and reinforce fault-tolerant quantum computing systems.

Scientists develop new way to tackle key quantum computing challenge

4. Gang That Circulated Fake Rs 20 Coins of Rs 70 Crore Value Busted

Key Highlights & Summary

- **Counterfeit Coin Syndicate Busted:** Saharanpur Police arrested five members of an organized syndicate involved in manufacturing and circulating fake Rs 20 coins with an estimated face value of over Rs 70 crore.
- **Inter-State Operational Network:** The syndicate operated across multiple states, including Uttar Pradesh, Punjab, Haryana, and Bihar, using dedicated units to mint and transport counterfeit coins.
- **Mass Production Capacity:** The illegal manufacturing setup had the machinery to produce 10,000 to 12,000 fake coins daily, which were subsequently distributed through liquor shops, toll plazas, and grocery stores.
- **Significant Physical Seizures:** Law enforcement seized 6,400 fake Rs 20 coins, semi-finished coins worth around Rs 5 lakh, and six coin-making machines during the operation in Titron, Saharanpur.
- **Parallel Probe by NIA:** The arrest follows a related investigation by the National Investigation Agency (NIA) into the recovery of Rs 17.29 crore in counterfeit currency from a nationalised bank's currency chest in the district.

Rs 70 crore in fake Rs 20 coins: How UP gang put them into circulation

- **Operational Synergy via Prison Networks:** The core network was formed inside Tihar Jail, highlighting structural challenges in prison intelligence and the re-offending capability of habitual criminals.

- **Article 246 of the Indian Constitution:** Grants Union Parliament exclusive legislative power over currency, coinage, legal tender, and the Reserve Bank of India under Entry 36 of List I (Union List).

Conclusion The busting of the multi-state counterfeit coin syndicate highlights persistent vulnerabilities in currency integrity and institutional security. Countering such large-scale economic offenses requires seamless inter-state police coordination, robust federal agency intervention via the NIA, and stringent oversight of currency chests to preserve financial stability and public trust in legal tender.

5. Chandrayaan-1 May Have Just Detected Oldest Impact Basin on Moon: Researchers

Key Highlights & Summary

- **Discovery of Ancient Impact Basin:** Researchers from the Physical Research Laboratory (PRL), Ahmedabad, identified the Australe Basin on the Moon's southeastern hemisphere using Chandrayaan-1 mineralogical data, which could predated the oldest known lunar impact basins.
- **Potential Record-Breaking Age:** PRL scientists indicate the Australe Basin might be older than the South Pole-Aitken Basin, which was formed over 4 billion years ago and was previously considered the Moon's oldest and largest known impact structure.



- **Unique Mineralogical Composition:** Unlike typical lunar basalts high in calcium, the volcanism within the Australe Basin features lower calcium and higher magnesium concentrations, along with 248 small basalt ponds arranged in a circular pattern.
- **Utilization of NASA's M3 Instrument:** The basin's mineralogy was confirmed using data from the Moon Mineralogy Mapper (M3), an imaging spectrometer onboard Chandrayaan-1 operating in the 405 to 3000 nanometer wavelength range.
- **Link to Chandrayaan-3 Shiv Shakti Point:** Findings show that magnesium-rich material excavated from ancient south polar impacts like Australe may have transported regolith to the Chandrayaan-3 landing site, located nearly 350 km away.
- **Significance for Future Missions:** The findings provide a geological framework for future lunar exploration and sample return missions, including NASA's proposed Moon Base and ISRO's Chandrayaan-4 mission.

6. India, Vietnam Agree to Deepen Defence Ties, Co-Produce Military Equipment

Key Highlights & Summary

- **Co-Production of Military Hardware:** India and Vietnam agreed to deepen bilateral defence and security cooperation, focusing on the co-production of Indian defence equipment to tackle growing security challenges in the Indo-Pacific region.
- **19th Joint Commission Meeting:** Co-chaired by External Affairs Minister S Jaishankar and Vietnam's Foreign Minister Le Hoai Trung in New Delhi, covering trade, defence, economic, scientific, and technological cooperation.

- **Proven Scalability of Face Auth:** Successful deployments of Aadhaar face authentication in Digi Yatra across 100+ airports and Jeevan Pramaan for 1.47 crore pensioners demonstrate its viability for roll cleaning.



As Election Commission begins SIR of voter list, here's what you need to do

8. In AfD's Rise, Questions About Democracy and Belonging

- **Electoral Surge in Saxony-Anhalt:** The far-right Alternative for Germany (AfD) secured 43.8% of the vote in Saxony-Anhalt, falling just three seats short of an absolute majority and highlighting expanding voter support.
- **Strain on the Democratic Firewall:** The *Brandmauer* (political firewall)—the consensus among mainstream parties to refuse coalitions with the far right—faces pressure as democratic containment institutions remain intact while the AfD's popular constituency expands.

- **Dilemma of Popular Will vs. Institutional Checks:** The AfD positions constitutional checks and political ostracization as anti-democratic barriers designed to silence the electorate, creating a friction between majoritarian impulses and constitutional norms.





- **Implications for European Stability:** Shifts in Germany's domestic political landscape carry wide-reaching consequences for the future of European Union integration, regional migration policy, and adherence to the rule of law.

9. Our Healthcare Boom Hides a Public-System Deficit

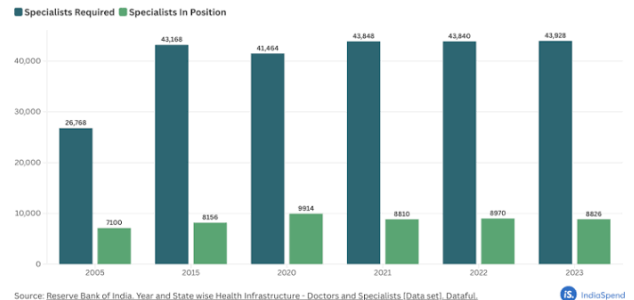
Key Highlights & Summary

- **Stagnant Public Health Expenditure:** Government health expenditure stood at 1.43% of GDP in 2022-23, falling significantly short of the 2.5% target mandated by the National Health Policy 2017.
- **Structural Shortages in Primary Healthcare:** Despite expanding medical education to 818 colleges and 1,28,875 undergraduate seats, rural Community Health Centres face 70-80% specialist shortages, and 17,788 sub-centres operate without dedicated buildings.

10. Why Punjab Still Lacks a Farm Policy

Key Highlights & Summary

- **Policy Background & Delays:** Punjab lacks a comprehensive agricultural policy despite being an agrarian state; the draft Punjab Agricultural Policy 2023, submitted by an 11-member committee under Sukhpal Singh, remains unimplemented.
- **Water Conservation & Crop Diversification:** The draft policy targets an initial 30% reduction in water usage, restricts long-duration paddy varieties, halts paddy cultivation in critically stressed areas, and promotes alternatives to the traditional wheat-paddy monoculture.

- **Institutional & Market Strengthening:** Recommends establishing 13 Centres of Excellence to position Punjab as a seed hub, strengthening 3,523 multi-purpose cooperative societies, modernising land-lease laws, and promoting organic farming and horticulture.
- **Legislative Endorsement for Phased Rollout:** In March 2026, a Punjab Vidhan Sabha committee led by MLA Gurpreet Singh Banawali recommended a phased implementation strategy if immediate full deployment is unfeasible.
- **Implementation Challenges:** Progress is stalled by severe state financial stress, lack of assured price support/procurement for alternative crops relative to wheat and paddy, and absent execution roadmaps.

Why Punjab still lacks a farm policy

PUNJAB IS primarily an agrarian state, yet it has never had a comprehensive agricultural policy. The previous Congress-ruled government made an attempt to formulate one, and the Aam Aadmi Party (AAP), after coming to power in 2022, continued efforts towards this end with the Punjab Agricultural Policy 2023. This March, a Punjab Vidhan Sabha committee also recommended its implementation.

So, why is Punjab still without a clear implementation road map? This assumes greater significance with Assembly elections due next year.

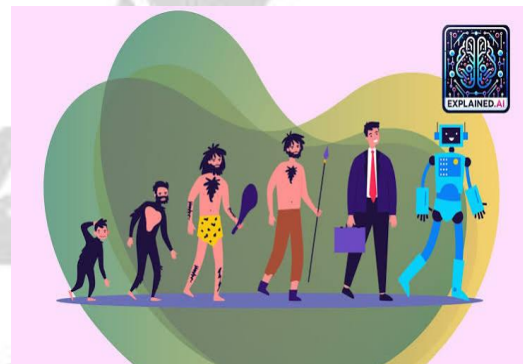

12. Hindi Diwas: How the Constituent Assembly Resolved India's Language Question

Key Highlights & Summary

- **Adoption of the Munshi-Ayyangar Formula:** On September 14, 1949, the Constituent Assembly adopted a pragmatic compromise formulated by K.M. Munshi and N. Gopalaswamy Ayyangar, steering clear of declaring a single "national language".

HISTORY

Hindi Diwas: How the Constituent Assembly resolved India's language question

ON SEPTEMBER 14, 1955, after years of debate, the Constituent Assembly adopted what is commonly known as the Munshi Ayyangar formula to settle the question of languages for official use in independent India.

Rather than declaring a 'national language', it designated Hindi as the 'official language of the Union', while allowing English to continue being used for all official purposes for 15 years after the commencement of the Constitution. The date is now commemorated as Hindi Diwas, but the journey to achieving consensus was long, and language remained one of the most contentious issues before the Assembly.

Long-debated problem

At Independence, most Indians spoke one of roughly a dozen major regional languages, while Hindi was the most widely spoken language. English was the language of colonial administration, even though less than 1% of Indians spoke it.

The main question then was whether English should be replaced by an indigenous language, and which language(s)

should have official status at the Centre. Political scientist Hanna Lerner writes in *The Oxford Handbook of The Indian Constitution*. "The two main factors in the assembly debate over the national language were the representatives of the Hindi-speaking areas, mostly from north-central India, and the representatives of non-Hindi-speaking regions, particularly from the south, as well as the moderate leaders of the Congress Party."

The Hindi-speaking representatives demanded that Hindi be declared the national language and replace English immediately. Lerner writes, "They claimed that a multilingual society was incompatible with Indian unity. Seth Govind Das, a Congress representative of the Central Provinces and Berar, stated, 'We want one language and one script for the whole country. We do not want it to be said that there are two cultures here.'"

Representatives from non-Hindi-speaking regions objected. The Hindi that regional unity required linguistic uniformity. Shri Shankarrao Deo of Bombay, the Congress General Secretary, stressed "Not uniformity but unity in diversity." Moderate Congress leaders, including Jawaharlal Nehru, recognised the practical difficulties

of making Hindi the national language.

Majority or consensus?

The language dispute also raised a procedural question: how should a national language be chosen? Hindi proponents demanded a simple majority vote, while their opponents argued for consensus, preferably unanimously.

Seth Govind Das articulated the Hindi-speaking position: "We have accepted democracy and democracy can only function when majority opinion is honoured. Whatever decision is arrived at the majority must be accepted by the minority respectfully and without any bitterness."

By contrast, S.P. Mookerjee of Bengal warned against imposing a majoritarian decision on linguistic minorities: "If it is claimed by anyone that by passing an article in the Constitution of India one language is going to be accepted by all by a process of coercion, I say, Sir, that that will not be possible to achieve."

Rajendra Prasad, President of the Constituent Assembly, similarly argued, "Whatever decision is taken, will have to be carried out by the country as a whole. Even if we succeed in getting a particular proposition passed by majority, it does not meet with the approval of any considerable section of people in the country, the implementation of the Constitution will become an arduous task."

A compromise is struck

The Assembly unanimously approved the Munshi Ayyangar formula in 1950, later incorporated into Articles 344-345 in Part XVII of the Indian Constitution. It was named after K.M. Munshi and N. Gopalaswamy Ayyangar, who were part of the Drafting Committee of the Constitution, with B.R. Ambedkar as the chairman. "Ultimately," notes Lerner, "it was the pragmatic consensus-seeking approach that triumphed."

The arrangement envisaged a 15-year transition, during which Hindi could increasingly be used by the Centre. Lerner adds, "In addition, the Constitution recognised fourteen other languages for official use (listed in the Eighth Schedule of the Constitution). The provincial governments were permitted to choose one of the regional languages or English for the conduct of their internal affairs, while English remained the language of inter-provincial communication."

But when that period ended in 1965, Hindi was still not widely used by the government. Following violent riots in non-Hindi-speaking states in the 1950s, Parliament renounced the ideal of a national language. The Official Languages Act of 1963 later stated that English would continue to be upheld as an official language alongside Hindi.

"At first blush, since Article 343 designates Hindi as the official language of the Union, it would seem that the proponents of Hindi were, notes academic Shit Choudhury in *The Oxford Handbook*, adding, 'But upon closer examination the resulting set of constitutional provisions reflects a multidimensional compromise between these two positions.'"

By distinguishing official administrative functions from national identity, India established a flexible linguistic framework that safeguards federalism and linguistic pluralism.
